Next week heralded as library week

Not a day goes by when hundreds of thousands of Americans don't benefit from one of the world's most valuable commodities — information.

The information industry is exploding. Knowledge and facts are multiplying at a dizzying rate. Those who know how to get the information they need are gaining. They're boosting their businesses, fulfilling their dreams, broadening their families' horizons.

Don't be left out. "Reach for a star. Ask a librarian." That's the message being spread throughout the country during this year's National Library Week celebration, April 22-28.

"Librarians are stars of the information age," Charles County Public Library Director Kitty Hurrey explained. "Sometimes people are confused and over-

whelmed by the vastness of information available. Librarians are here to help them find whatever information they need. We encourage people to ask questions."

Hurrey noted that many people rave about the expert assistance they receive from library staff.

"As a scientist and a writer, most of the books I need are exotic, out of print, newly published, and rarely part of the normal holdings of a public library. Your librarians have been so good about ferreting out the most obscure things for me," one patron said. "Interlibrary loan service allows me to borrow material from any library in the country at my local library branch."

A representative from an agency which serves a hearing impaired population wrote, "Thank you for allowing our hearing impaired clients to use your TTY (teletypewriter) communications equipment." The TTY at the La Plata Branch of the Charles County Public Library allows deaf patrons to call for information or help in contacting agencies, businesses, or friends who do not have TTY equipment.

"Your Outreach Service to Day Care Mothers is wonderful," commented a home daycare provider. "The children in my care really enjoy the books you deliver every month and the storytime specials are the highlight of the season!"

And a grateful patron praised another outreach service, "Since my mother cannot drive or walk well enough to use your libraries, we appreciate the Large Print Books your Outreach Librarian selects and delivers to Mom's home."
