Adequate libraries are essential to the community

An adequate library is not a luxury but one of the necessities of any community that prides itself on its high quality of life. Anyone who has visited the Charles County Public Library will not be surprised to learn that the demand for library services has increased significantly. Over the past two years there has been a 33 percent increase in the number of people attending children and adult learning classes, and there has been a 120 percent increase in the number of events offered at the La Plata

library. A general building assessment conducted by Providence Associates, LLC looked at library space in four peer library systems, Alexandria, Carroll, Frederick, and Wicomico. Of these libraries, CCPL has the least amount of total library space at 0.43 sf per capita. The high was 0.79 square feet per capita in Carroll, followed by 0.71 in Alexandria, 0.6 in Frederick, and 0.55 in Wicomico. The average for Maryland public libraries is 0.6 sf per capita. The recommendation is to replace the La Plata branch with a 30,000-35,000-squarefoot building. A 33,000-squarefoot building would bring our square footage per capita up to 0.55.

CCPL is an outstanding library system, but we have outgrown our main branch in La Plata. The current build-

ing does not have adequate parking, public meeting space, staff work space, and most importantly it is not handicap accessible which could be viewed as discriminatory. The sole meeting room is fully booked, yet the public has made it clear to us that we need more space.

The La Plata branch is the library system's oldest facility and is located in the seat of Charles County government. The 50-year-old, two-story facility serves as the branch library for the La Plata area and houses our mobile services department. The approved CIP, page 350, lists our current building at 12,889 square feet and provides for a 13,000-square-foot replacement building, just 111 square foot larger. For perspective, the proposed 13,000-squarefoot building would be smaller than our P.D. Brown branch, which is 14,300 square feet. P.D. Brown has no meeting room and very little office space.

The size and age of the La Plata branch inhibits our ability to provide 21st century public library services. Charles County residents are looking to their library for meeting spaces of all sizes- from small tutoring and study groups to large economic development meetings and STEM programming spaces. By providing the community with the space and tools needed to train for jobs,

start businesses, and to learn new skills, the library serves as an important partner in the economic and educational development of the county. Investing in a suitably-sized replacement library is one of the most valuable investments and with the highest returns. For every dollar spent on public libraries residents receive an estimated \$5-\$8 in economic value.

Replacing the La Plata branch with adequate space will fulfill our mission to provide opportunities for our community to engage, discover, and learn. The proposed 13k-square-foot replacement will be overwhelmed before it is built and will leave Charles County in the dust of other peer communities. Instead, we urge the Charles County Commissioners and county residents to support a building that meets the needs described in the library's facilities master plan — a 30,000-35,000 square foot space that will serve the county well for years to come.
