Jainson Cedillo is an Ecuadorian-American artist, born in Queens, NY, and raised for part of his life in Passaic, NJ, currently based in Baltimore, Maryland. Jainson's body of work weaves together his Hispanic heritage and queerness, blending expressive figures, vibrant colors, and personal narratives. Through his drawings, he explores these intersecting identities using bold symbolism, rich patterning, and emotional figuration. Camila Leão is a Baltimore-based multimedia artist working across illustration, murals, public art, and fine art.
